


Rights Respecting School Award

Article 29 Goals of Education

Children's education should develop each child's personality, talents and abilities to the fullest.

It should encourage children to respect others, human rights and their own and other cultures.

It should also help them learn to live peacefully, protect the environment and respect other people.

Children have a particular responsibility to respect the rights their parents, and education should aim to develop respect for the values and culture of their parents.

In assembly this week, the children discussed the concept of 'fairness'. They discussed what fairness is and then related this to Fairtrade. The children explored what Fairtrade is and how important their work is in countries around the world. To consolidate their learning surrounding this topic, the children took part in a quiz about what they had learned and even had the opportunity to win some Fairtrade chocolate!

On Thursday, Year 3 shared their class assembly with the school and parents. The children have spent the last few weeks campaigning to support their chosen charity: Comic Relief. The children created posters to advertise their fundraising day on 15th March, where children came into school dressed in red for a donation of a pound. The class also held a joke competition at lunchtime that day and the winners from the competition performed their jokes in Year 3's

assembly this week. In total, the school raised £175, which could fund hot meals for children in refugee camps, school books, stationery and much more!

The steering group met this week to discuss a way to ensure that all children are having their voice heard around school. We agreed that a post-box would be placed in the hall, where children can post comments and ideas that they would like



discussed at steering group meetings. The children spent the remainder of the meeting creating a poster to advertise this development to ensure that all members of the school recognise how they can have their ideas heard. The children also decided upon prizes for the end of term awards. The children came up with the following initial ideas:

Bronze - ½ hour extra break

Silver - Film and treats

Gold - Visit to Cobtree Park

The children will learn more about this in an assembly next week where the prize ideas will be shared and decided as final.
